Purpose of this Memorandum

This memorandum provides information about Metro's upcoming <u>SafeTrack</u> plan as it relates to student and staff transportation this summer and throughout the school year.

Impact of SafeTrack Projects

The first of 15 "Safety Surge" projects included in Metro's <u>SafeTrack</u> plan begins June 4th. While the majority of the surge projects will not have a direct impact on Metro stations frequently used by students, every surge project will result in ripple effects throughout the system. Staff and students should expect longer wait times, crowded platforms and trains, and more crowded buses, along with increased street traffic for cars and buses.

Over the next few weeks, the Transportation Working Group* will analyze student ridership data recently provided by Metro to identify the likely impact of each surge project on specific schools. To assist with immediate planning needs, Metro has identified schools within ¼ mile of Metro rail stations that will be directly involved in each surge project. (See attached.) In addition, please note the two surge projects that are expected to have significant impacts system-wide, and particularly on schools:

- <u>Surge 2</u> (June 18 July 3): Eastern Market to Minnesota Ave/Benning Rd line segment shutdown (orange, blue, and silver lines) with limited bus bridge between stations
- <u>Surge 10</u> (October 10 November 1): Fort Totten to NoMa line segment shutdown (red line).
