I want our students and families to feel safe knowing that we take these protections seriously, and we are working to ensure that all residents know and can take advantage of their rights. Some schools have already sent <u>messages</u> to their students and families informing them of these rights, and the U.S. Department of Education released a <u>statement</u> on diversity and inclusion with a number of resources.

We thank you for the hard work that you do each day to ensure that all of our students get the educational experience they need and deserve. Recently, you may have heard me quote Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. when he said, "Darkness cannot drive out darkness: only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate: only love can do that." These words are as meaningful and appropriate today as they were Dr. King first said them.

I support your ongoing commitment to creating learning environments that are safe spaces for our students to learn, grow, and thrive. Each day, we must remind one another – especially our students – how far kindness will take us.

Put simply, we are all in this together. We are Washington, DC.
