What is the 2023 Boundary and Student Assignment Study?

A set of recommendations based on analytic findings and community feedback about how families and students can access public schools.

Types of recommendations:

- Updated DCPS school boundaries
- Revised school feeder patterns
- Suggested programmatic opportunities
- Added enrollment lottery preferences

Legislated per the <u>Attendance Zone Boundaries</u> <u>Amendment Act of 2022</u>

- A strong system of by-right neighborhood schools
- Equitable access to high quality schools
- Predictable and continuous access to schools
- Racially and socio-economically diverse schools

Focused on addressing 7 priority challenges




Advisory Committee priority challenges

- Unbalanced enrollments among DCPS boundary schools
- Inequitable availability of robust programming and rigorous curriculum in all communities across the city
- Inequitable availability and access to special education programming near families, especially in Wards 7 and 8
- Mismatched access to early childhood seats in Title 1 schools
- Some students and families feel unsafe traveling to and from school
- System-related enrollment instability

Implementation timeframe

Boundary and Feeder Revisions

- Earliest would be **SY25-26**
- Enrolled students can continue
 to attend their school through the
 last grade offered
- Brief period of feeder phase-in and sibling enrollment grandfathering


Grade Configuration and Other Policies

- Longer timeframe for implementation
- Once recommendation is accepted, more school engagement to come
- Implementation details to be determined in coordination with schools
- Phasing in is expected



Wheatley EC Challenges

- Low engagement from boundary
- Low enrollment overall and particularly in middle grades







Wheatley Education Campus Enrollment Facts

- Enrollment for the elementary school grades peaked at 240 in SY14-15. The lowest enrollment was 217 in SY20-21.
 - SY23-24 reported enrollment shows an increase over SY22-23
- Enrollment for middle school grades peaked in SY13-14 and matched the SY17-18 low of 70 in SY22-23.
 - SY23-24 reported enrollment remains around the same.




Wheatley EC Enrollment by In Boundary

In boundary enrollment for elementary grades in percentage terms has remained static at between 55% and 57% since SY19-20 but there was a drop in SY22-23 to 51%.

By the same measure for middle school grades, there increase each year since SY20-21, from 53% to 56% in SY22-23.


Wheatley Education Campus School Choices

Re-enrollment rate is 68% overall compared to the citywide average of 82%. (DC School Report Card)

About half of the 5th grade Wheatley students in SY21-22 continued to 6th grade in SY22-23, 13 students.

Wheatley 6th grade students attract just a few new students from other DCPS or charter schools: CW Harris, Savoy, Rocketship (not shown)


Where Do Students from Wheatley Education Campus Go to School the Following Year?




